Home Care Graduation

On 6th December 2024, the IHPCA Home Care students graduated with a ceremony in HAU. This course is designed to help caregivers provide excellent care to patients including the elderly, people with dementia, children with challenging behavior and those coping with mental health issues.





The Home Care graduates attended the Caregivers Trainer's Symposium organized by The Aged Family Uganda (TAFU) at Nsambya Sharing Hall from 18th- 19th December 2024. Hospice Africa Uganda was thanked for its professional training and in particular the clinical team for its care and love for the students.

Visit to Benin

Our International Programmes Director Dr. Eddie Mwebesa and nurse/ trainer Sylvia Dive travelled to Benin in October to assess the country's suitability as a model for palliative care for Francophone Africa, and to explore the potential for a long term placement for Sylvia to offer technical assistance there. Benin showed much promise as a potential model for palliative care. HAU was recognized at Benin's 3rd National Palliative Care congress for its support to Benin's Palliative care development.

Memorial Service

I STILL MATTER, NO MATTER WHAT: A PATIENT STORY

60-year-old JK walked into Mobile Hospice Mbarara having battled chronic liver disease for the past three years. Despite seeking treatment from various facilities, his condition had not improved, and he had lost hope. His primary goal was to completely eliminate the discomfort he was going through, something that was proving really challenging.

The hospice team provided medications, conducted paracentesis (tapping), and offered counseling to help JK understand his condition and to establish care goals.

Socially, JK's life was complex. He had four wives: one was deceased, he was separated from two and one, SK, remained by his side. In total, JK had 10 children from all his marriages. Once a thriving businessman who enjoyed a vibrant social life, JK's illness forced him to abandon his work, leaving him with debts exceeding 75 million Ugandan shillings across four financial institutions. The team discovered a financial claim on his house, with the words "PAY BANK LOAN" written prominently on it.

To address this, the team encouraged SK to communicate with the financial institutions to explain JK's condition. This alleviated some pressure. However, JK remained adamant about repaying his debts before passing, motivated by the desire to secure his family's future.

In addition to his financial troubles, JK faced land disputes with his first wife, who hoped to claim all the land for herself and her children after his death. Despite having already allocated portions of his land to each wife for their children's benefit, JK's first wife contested his decisions. The case was in court, moving at a slow pace. With the team's support, consultations were made with AKAO Refugee, an organization providing legal aid, particularly for gender-based violence cases. AKAO confirmed that JK had a strong case and offered him legal advice. Remarkably, JK insisted on personally attending all court hearings and ultimately won the case.

The hospice team continues to provide comprehensive support for JK and his family, including pain and symptom management, ongoing counseling, and family support. The local council (LC) has also remained actively involved. After the court's final decision, JK's first wife ceased her legal case, allowing the family some peace.

JK regularly reminds the team that he still matters to his family, and he will fight for their wellbeing as long as the hospice stands by them. His resilience exemplifies the hospice's belief: "You matter until the last day of life."
